

THE RIDES OF 2017

This summer we will have two four-day rides, one five-day ride and two six-day trail rides in Waterton Lakes National Park (a World UNESCO Site) in south western Alberta, Canada. (Note: more rides will be added as demand permits.) We have added the four day rides after listening to potential riders who were looking for a shorter trip because of time constraints. Our base camp will be located just outside of the border of Waterton Lakes National Park (Parks policy will not allow us to have our camp within the National park) and in the same spot as last summer. Inside this newsletter you will see the improvements that we are making to the camp. Our outfitter, Deb Watson, has also added three new rides to our package of trips which allows us to further customize each day and each ride. 2017 Abbreviated Itinerary:


- Depart the Acclaim Hotel near the airport in Calgary by van with a stop at Head-Smashed-in-Buffalo-Jump, a world UNESCO site. http://www.history.alberta.ca/headsmashedin/. We were there two years ago and it was VERY popular with our guests and we had many requests to return. After a hearty lunch at camp, we will have a short three-hour "primer ride" on the Waterton Lakes/Golf Course loop which will include a safety talk by the guides.
- During the next few days we will have some spectacular rides to Lone Lake, Goat Lake, and Addison Lake/Carthew Summit (all new rides) which will be added to our standard rides of: Blue Lake and the spectacular Spionkop Ridge, "the Lion's Head," Avion Ridge, Twin Lakes, Rowe Lakes, Crandell Lake, the Horseshoe Basin, and Loon Lake. Our goal on each ride

will be to evaluate the guests' riding ability and the weather. Thus, each day and each trip will then be customized so that each person is in the best position to see new countryside, but based upon safety and weather. Additionally, we are making an improvement to the optional boat cruise down Waterton Lake to Goat Haunt in Glacier National Park U.S.A. Departing at 10:00 am, the passengers will disembark for a short 45 minute hike to some falls, guided by a U.S. Park Ranger. After enjoying their picnic lunch, the guests will then return on the 2:00 pm sailing to be followed by some shopping in the Village of Waterton.

- Each day will we will return to our camp by shuttle for the usual fare of great food and fellowship. (not sure how to improve on Ashley's hot Saskatoon pie and ice cream!)
- Our evening Doughnut entertainment will be quite different this year; a step in a new direction and you can read more about it in this newsletter or by clicking on the "What's new in 2017" on the website. http://trailridevacations.com/new-in-2017/

CALLING BACK ALL TRAIL RIDERS! IT'S REUNION TIME!



DEE BARRUS: FOREVER AT HOME ON THE RANGE

Like learning to walk for most people, Dee Barrus doesn't remember the first time he rode a horse. The owner of Alpine Stables, the Trail Riders' outfitter in Waterton, grew up on a farm outside Cardston in southern Alberta. He rode horseback five kilometres to school every day until he was eight. After riding five kilometres back he'd jump back on and go exploring on the prairie and into coulees, tracking animals and having fun. So, while horses were just a part of Barrus's life, he remembers discovering the mountains.

As a teenager he volunteered to protect herds of sheep in the foothill canyons north of Waterton Lakes National Park near Trail Rider's destinations like Blue Lake and Mill Creek. His father and other ranchers dropped the sheep and Barrus off in the canyons at the start of the summer and then came back to pick them up in September. Barrus's job was to keep the grizzlies and sheep apart. He's got more than a few wild tales of lost sheep, charging grizzlies and firing a shotgun blindly into the night. But what stands out more than 60 years later, is how those teenage summers under the big peaks percolated into his soul. "That's when I developed my interest in the mountains," he says. "That's when I started wanting to get into the mountains as much as I could."

Now at 82 the interest shows no signs of diminishing. Even though it seems like the natural fit, Alpine Stables and guiding trail rides were actually part of Act Two in Barrus's life. After the three room school house he rode to each day became a one room school, Barrus's dad moved the family into Cardston and commuted to the mixed farm and ranch. Beyond horses, Barrus grew up loving automotive mechanics. Out of high school he worked on Chevys and Fords out of a Cardston garage. "After a number of years I decided I didn't want to grow old swinging wrenches," he remembers. He always had an aptitude and interest in sharing his knowledge with others so he took a job at a high school in Lethbridge teaching auto mechanics. Twenty three years later high school lost its charm and he switched careers again; this time to work for Alberta Fish and Game. He'd drive around the province to small communities teaching people how to run their own trap lines and licensing new trappers. He even converted himself. Barrus still runs three trap lines in Alberta, one near Cardston, another near Bragg Creek and the main one in a roadless stretch of northern Alberta near Lac la Biche. He spends less time on the trap lines these days; a few weeks versus the whole winter, but he still loves the work. "It keeps me involved in a country I dearly love," he says.



Barrus retired from the Fish and Game job in 2015 to focus exclusively on the trail riding business he started in 1969. That's when Waterton Park was looking for a new horse guiding business. Barrus and his brother-in-law put in a submission and won. *Alpine Stables* was born. At that time there was nothing at their present location just north of the townsite.

"It was a struggle to finance it," he says. "No ordinary financial institution wanted to put out money for it." But he managed to make it work on his teacher salary. It was a dream job for Barrus. "I was riding in the mountains, I liked to work with people and I was sharing all my favourite spots," he says. Business steadily improved. Today, beyond outfitting the TRCR for the last two summers, Alpine Stables is as busy as it can be running day trips and hour long rides from its base. A sister operation, Blue Ridge Outfitters, to the north of the park and the TRCR base camp is equally busy. Luckily for Barrus he has his family to fall back on when things get too crazy. His brother-in-law left after only a few years as a partnership, but the business has always been a family operation with his wife Lorna, kids and their kids; all working alongside Barrus over the years. "It makes it easy to find good help," he says. "They've all been raised in the business. They know what it's about and what they have to do. It's not like bringing in a kid from Toronto and trying to teach him how to operate a trail ride."



He wishes he could say the same for the other half of the trail riding equation: the horses. Finding good trail horses is harder than ever. "Most horses are trained to go round and round an arena - they're not broke at all," he says. "What's that horse going to do if a rain coat falls off the horse in front of him or something jumps out of the bushes? It will be at least two years before you can trust him." Instead, Barrus is always looking for horses broken on the trail or on the prairie where they've lived with rain storms and high winds, animals jumping out of bushes and herding cattle. "They're totally different horses," he says. Even then, new horses are only ridden by a guide for the first summer or two. It's just another challenge for Barrus who's never shied a challenge. He has more to come. As anyone that's ridden with Barrus can attest, he may look like he's spent 82 years on a horse but he doesn't act it. He hops in and out of a saddle smoother than most people ever will. Still, he is in his 80s and "five foot seven inches and shrinking." How many more years will he keep guiding trips? "As long as I can," he says. And when he can't anymore? He laughs: "I guess I'll go ride by myself."

WENEED YOUR VOICE! CALL RIDER OF THE POLICE OF THE POLICE

What your Board of Directors are asking you to do is write to the following government representatives and politicians telling them the following:

- That you were a guest on a trail ride in 2015 (or any other previous year) and thoroughly enjoyed yourself. Further, you regard this as an important part of your summer vacation plans.
- 2. That you fully support the use of horses in the National Parks and that you are very much against the elimination of horses for tourism.
- 3. Please remind these government officials in your letter that The Trail Riders of the Canadian Rockies bring tens of thousands of dollars into the Alberta and Canadian economies every year.
- 4. Please remind these government officials that the National Parks act is very clear and states that, "the Parks are for the enjoyment of the people." Further state that the T.R.C.R. has as an excellent reputation for environmental stewardship and very much supports these measures. However, National Parks are not wildlife sanctuaries, and the people of this country and our international visitors have a right to see the backcountry of the National parks.
- Please conclude your letter by asking the government to expand the number of campsites the T.R.C.R. can use in Banff National Park. As well as increasing the number of riders per day.



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Walter Nixon of Invermere, B.C.

WALTER NIXON, veteran "mountain man", Canadian Rockies guide and rancher, guided the Earl of Athlone and Princess Alice on their hunting trip through the East Kootenay area during which the

Governor General brought down a large mountain goat.

Walter Nixon, pictured here, is one of the best-known guides for big game hunting on the western slopes of the Canadian Rockies adjoining the Simpson Summit and Mount Assiniboine, which districts he traps during the winter months.

Originally from Ontario, Guide Nixon has ranched in the Upper Columbia Valley, B.C., for almost forty years; has been a game warden in that area and in the Kootenay River and Leanchoil districts.

In addition, he was one of the founders and charter members of the Trail Riders of the Canadian Rockies, an organization now world-famous. The birth place was the Wolverine Plateau in British Columbia west of the Banff-Windermere automobile road.

Walter has marked on a Government Survey Map (here reproduced) the location of the basin and lake where the Governor General bagged his mountain goat. This location can be recognized by Trail Riders from its proximity to Og Lake. If we are not mistaken it is on the route of Walter Nixon's winter trapping lines.

We are pleased to announce that the TRCR has contracted its hosting and music duties to three entertainers that we know you will enjoy.







THE TOWNSEND TROPHY

The Townsend Trophy, inscribed "Trail Riders of the Canadian Rockies COUNTRY LIFE TROPHY for the best nature photography taken on the Official Trail Ride presented by Reginald Townsend".

Reginald T. Townsend (1890-1977),
 the editor of the American edition of Country Life

The history of this trophy goes back to the very first trail ride in 1923, not long after the first national parks were created. During those early years, Reginald Townsend was the official photographer for the T.R.C.R. In 1929, he donated the Townsend Trophy to be awarded annually to the best amateur photograph taken on the trail.

There are 5 categories:

- Flora & Fauna
- In Camp
- Mountain Scenery
- On the Trail
- Horses and People

Our judges are volunteers from the Calgary Camera Club, with head judge Graeme Kershaw.

Graeme has outlined below how the judges approached this task, "Pictures are judged based on technical merit and WOW factor". The technical side included such things as pictures:

- being sharp and in focus
- proper exposure
- good composition i.e. don't cut off a horse at the feet.

The WOW factor is what makes a picture stand out. It may be in part technique but is usually due to having a new or unusual subject or an old subject presented in a different way. Generally speaking technique is learned and planned. WOW factor maybe planned but is often just being in the right place at the right time.

The winner in each category will receive a framed plaque and their photos will appear in the TRCR calendar. The winner of Best of Show will receive a miniature of the original trophy donated by Reginald Townsend in 1929 as well as an engraved plaque that will be added to the base of that trophy.

The photograph should epitomize Trail Riding, including elements that are distinctly representative of the TRCR; horses, riders, teepee town, campfires, mountain scenery, etc.) and can be color or blackand-white. All entries become property of the TRCR for our calendar, albums or advertising.


