We can't wait to see you again next year—or to welcome you for the first time! Together, we'll experience the wild beauty of the Rockies from a perspective few ever get to see.







## The Misty Mountain Riders

The Misty Mountain Riders consisted of 10 lovely ladies from British Columbia, Alberta, Idaho, and Georgia and their exceptional 2 amazing guides, Abby and Lola.

This was ride number 8 for the Trail Riders of the Canadian Rockies and the last ride of the season. TRCR paired with Banff Trail Riders as outfitters is a match made in heaven. This is the only ride the TRCR does in Lodges, and that extra level of comfort, especially in cool, cloudy weather, is well worth it. The ride started chilly – it was cool and cloudy at 930 on a Thursday morning when

we saddled up. What a lovely variety of horses – I had a good sized bay roan, little Coal was, guess what colour? Black! And a couple of bays, a few sorrels and a beautiful grulla, all sturdy, steady, sound mounts.

Due to 8 inches of snow 2 weeks before, the trails were more than ankle deep in

muddy water. The first stop for lunch along the river was so beautiful. The guides pulled out a barbecue, and we had steak and a choice of salad. That little barbecue amazes me. Having hot drinks at lunch on a chilly, cloudy, misty day was so warming.

Around 4 ish, we rode into the corral at Sundance Lodge. There were Flush Toilets!!! Hot showers! Appetizers were waiting for us to enjoy on the table, and another group of Wild Women! That's actually the name of their

organization, Wild Women Trips. We shared how good the trip was.

Supper was delicious honey orange Salmon with sweet potato and asparagus — This is where the 5-star rating comes in — excellent food consisting of appetizer, soup, salad, entree and dessert. All inclusive. It was my dream come true — horses, mountains, riding, sharing stories and photos and more than enough food.

The next day, we had a great breakfast and a

relaxed start and trudged in the cold up to Halfway Lodge. It is cozier than Sundance, much higher, and still has great food, but what makes it special is the view from the shower. You can look down from the shower to the creek, straight ahead are fields and trees, and then the Sundance range looms over top of you. Truly amazing.



The third day is the ride to Allenby Pass. From there, you are supposed to be able to see Mount Assiniboine, the Matterhorn of the Rockies. It is a beautiful mountain that stands head and shoulders above everything else. But it was still cold, cloudy, and windy, and we felt like real mountain explorers as we braved the weather for photos at the pass and hurried down to lunch out of the wind. I was lucky enough to ride to Mount Assiniboine last year. It is extraordinary.

The fourth day was optional, relaxing at the cabin or a mountain hike with our delightful guides, Abby and Lola. These guides were hikers as well as horseback guides! Up we went bushwhacking through willow, struggling over downed trees, to a lovely waterfall that crashed down over the steep rocks. Some of us turned back at this point, and some of us continued up the steep trail, grabbing bushes for handholds to the most bewitching lake. Our own private lake! An osprey soared up above us, and ducks paddled in the lake. Lunch could not have been better. I could have stayed up there forever. But real life called. We rode back to Sundance the next day and then down to Banff again and said goodbye to our horses and the mountains.

For me, my 7<sup>th</sup> ride with the TRCR, the lodges made such a difference from sleeping on cots in a tent or tipi. I guess I am just getting old! Life is not measured by how many breaths you take, but by how many moments take your breath away. And having a hot shower and a comfy bed doesn't hurt.

Our cooks and meals were great, our packers with the mule train didn't break or lose anything, and our two guides were absolutely

the best. Abby was calm and cheerful, and Lola told us the story of her Close Encounter with bear number 122, The Boss.

The Boss is a local grizzly, a legend in his own time. He is over 20 years old, big, and has a distinctive chewed-off ear. He has been hit by the train not once but twice, but so far, he has not become habituated to humans. He continues to father more grizzlies in the Banff area than any other bear has.

You don't want to see this bear when you are leading a pack trip down the trail.

But Lucky Lola did. He came up onto their trail and she had to turn her ride around, calmly head back to the barns, radio in the situation, and a posse came to help! Gratefully and luckily the Boss just kept on going thru the yard and headed north to wherever he wanted to go.

Bears are an Apex predators – our guides and cooks and seeing grouse and everything combined to make our ride An Apex ride.

# Memory Lane

### My First Ride

I was still wearing the clothes that I had worn on the ride. After a week of not getting much sleep on the ride, I found a seat at the airport and dozed off. When I started hearing the announcements, I woke up, and when I moved, the biggest swarm of flies I ever saw flew from me.

I first heard about the Trail Riders of the Canadian Rockies around 1971, when a curious 21-year-old was walking around Banff and saw a sign on the building that said "Brewster Outfitters." I had no idea what an outfitter was, so to satisfy my curiosity, I opened their front door and met a young lady named Linda Hawkins. She greeted me and answered my questions with tremendous enthusiasm.

She not only explained what an outfitter did but was also involved with the Trail Riders of the Canadian Rockies. Her description of the TRCR had me sold. This was mid-summer, so I booked to come back for ride number seven, which was the last ride of the summer.

The main feature of that ride and all other rides was the people I had the pleasure of meeting. That includes fellow riders, packers, guides, cooks, MCs, and all the organizers. On my first ride, I met Dennis Orr and Stuart Watkins and have kept in touch with them for over fifty years.

I told myself I would not list people's names in case I missed someone, but what the heck? I am certain that a lot of people would have


known and ridden with the following folks; Lou **Brownie** Shulman, Aikman, Lois Laycraft, Chick Fowler, Dr. Bruce Hatfield, Sol Lipkind, Norm Marriott, McBeath, Mona Parry, Charlie Wittaker, Hal & Liz Cormier, Bill Stainton, Ginny Bowness, Grant Clark, Miriam Berkley, French, Bill Bunny Robinson, Andy Russell, Sudol, Frank Brassard, Irene Dick.



The staff were all characters. Over the years, I got to know the following staff members on the rides and when they were not on duty. Ron Warner was a packer on my first ride along with Dan Heather. Guides were Mike Crawley, Dick Wales. The cook on the ride was Jane Raby, who eventually was married to a warden at Banff National Park

At the end of my first ride, I had three things in my pocket. A bus ticket from Banff to Calgary, a plane ticket from Calgary to Charlottetown, and fifty cents. As a result, I caught a greyhound in Calgary and started scanning the sky to see where the planes were landing. I started walking towards the airport carrying my gear in a duffel bag and got to the airport in the middle of the night. Keep in mind that I was still wearing the clothes that I had worn on the ride. After a week of not getting much sleep on the ride, I found a seat at the airport and dozed off. When I started hearing the announcements, I woke up, and when I moved, the biggest swarm of flies I ever saw flew from me. Mind you, there was no one sitting close to me at the time. Every time I think of this memory, it brings a smile to my face. If you can, take the opportunity and get out on a ride. 
